THE NATIONAL HISPANIC INSTITUTE REPORT CARD

(HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 2014)

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Summary: The following report provides an overview of the undergraduate enrollment trends that were exhibited by National Hispanic Institute (NHI) alumni who graduated from high school in the spring of 2014.

PART 1, INTRODUCTION

I. National Hispanic Institute

NHI's work concentrates on selecting the caliber of high school and college age youth with the greatest potential to succeed. We engage them in leadership learning experiences that further their leadership readiness and capacities. Latino communities both in the U.S. and internationally are fortunate to benefit from the large pools of upcoming youth talent that represent immense community potential.

NHI's work is primarily conducted during the summer when U.S. schools are in recess. In collaboration with several colleges and universities, NHI experiences are held on campuses over 5-8 days. More than 1,200 alumni volunteers assist with NHI's community leadership programs, annually playing various training roles and functions. Over 3,000 students participate each summer coast to coast and located in key geographic centers throughout the United States including Texas, Colorado, California, Illinois, New York, Florida and Pennsylvania. Panama, through *Ciudad del Saber* (City of Knowledge), is the current abroad nation that hosts an international program.

Annually, 2,500 students attend NHI programs in which 26 states and 7 countries are represented.

II. NHI Leadership Programs

The National Hispanic Institute yields a strong response rate (85.8%) from its high school class of 2014. At the Great Debate (9th grade level), we have found that students who participate in 4-day programs produce a higher response rate for college enrollment and continued NHI participation as compared to a 6-day program. Four-day programs include prior training for students with their local communities NHI Great Debate team. This training can last sometimes for up to six months in which students are training for the Great Debate tournament. A student's participation in this event increases the likelihood of them enrolling in college and/or participating further with the National Hispanic Institute.

At the LDZ (10th grade/11th grade level), our international students who participate at the LDZ Las Americas are showing the highest level of participation for their college enrollment and continued involvement with the National Hispanic Institute. Furthermore, 9/10 students who participate in the LDZ are likely to declare enrollment in to a college/university.

Lastly, the CWS yields the highest response rate (97.8% average) for students who continue their involvement in this capstone experience. CWS participants represent NHI's most polished alumni: 9/10 students at this level have already participated in one or two NHI programs. In addition, we notice that 2/3 students are attracted to traveling to the Northeast United States to work with colleges/universities for their college selection process.

PART 3, RECENT FINDINGS

I. Longstanding Trends: Academic Excellence & Enhanced Civic Participation

Annually, NHI high school alumni enroll in college at a 98% rate, pursue competitive/selective institutions at a 94% rate and graduate within 4-5 years at a 90% rate. NHI Alumni also enroll in advanced studies at a 67% rate.

II. Recent Findings: 2011-2013 Report Cards

Despite the drop in total student participants since 2011, students are responding at higher rates, both numerically and on average, for the National Hispanic Institute's Report Card. This represents a strengthening educational curriculum that the National Hispanic Institute has incorporated in which students and the organization are building a long-term relationship/impact with each other. Not to mention, NHI students feel more confident to enroll straight in to four-year colleges/universities than pursuing junior/community colleges immediately.

I. The Sample

The information that follows provides a cumulative view of participants of NHI leadership programs who enrolled as entering college freshmen during the 2014-2015 academic year. These students are representative of the combined participants of the Institute's summer youth leadership programs that attended one or more of the organization's Great Debate for ninth grade students, Lorenzo de Zavala for sophomores, and/or Collegiate World Series for juniors.

The numbers clearly show that NHI student college enrollment rates continue to be among the highest in the United States. In 1988, an NHI survey focused on 185 Texas student residents who graduated from high school two years prior. Our survey results found that 98% of these Texas student residents had successfully enrolled as college freshmen. Twenty-six years later, the same trend holds with our high school graduating Class of 2014. However, during this period, there was a significant increase and expansion in the number of students that the National Hispanic Institute serves each year. Over two

decades ago, students surveyed were Texas residents and less than 200. By 2014 student participation had increased to 2,400 participants and came from 14 states (including Puerto Rico) and 3 Latin American countries.

To give an accurate accounting of this survey, some Latin American students were omitted from a Class of 2014 student roster comprised of 1,140 because of their delayed graduation year. For purposes of this evaluation, 1,066 U.S. and international high school graduates represented the available for the survey. Of this number, 85.8% (915 students) responded and formed the basis for the conclusions reported below.

- 63.6% (678) of the students were Texas residents
- 10.6% (113) were Midwestern residents (includes Illinois, Nebraska, Missouri)
- 9.1% (97) were Latin American residents (includes Mexico, Panama and Dominican Republic)
- 7.8% (83) were Northeastern residents (includes New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Washington D.C. and Maryland)
- 5.6% (60), Western residents (includes New Mexico, Colorado, Arizona, California and Utah)
- 2.9% (31) were Puerto Rico residents
- 0.4% (4) were Southeastern States residents primarily from Florida

IV. Undergraduate Enrollment

Based on our findings, 98.1% of NHI students enrolled as entering college freshmen. The remaining 1.9% (20 students) pursued GAP year study abroad programs, joined the armed forces, or entered the labor force.

Of the combined entering college freshmen, 93% (973 students) enrolled in 4-year colleges and universities. Approximately 7% (73 students) enrolled in 2-year community colleges. This downward trend in 2-year colleges marked a decrease of 3% from previous years.

Approximately 82% (876 students) US resident students (including Puerto Rico) enrolled in four-year colleges and universities. Of this group, 28% (245 students) traveled out-of-state while 72% (631 students) remained in-state.

Of the 973 total attending four-year colleges, 59% (574 students) enrolled in domestic public colleges/universities. Conversely 32% (311 students) enrolled in domestic private colleges/universities. Interestingly 8.5% (83 students) chose to

attend colleges/universities abroad, which include countries such as Argentina, England, Mexico, Panama, Philippines, Scotland, South Korea and Venezuela. Finally, 0.5% (5 students) received appointments to military academies.

On the other end, despite the difference in Male/Female student population, both genders evaluate college enrollment the same for public universities and private universities. We found that both males and females enroll in public colleges/universities at a 54% rate and private colleges/universities at a 29% rate.
